Presentations 2.1 CE Grants & Round 9 Scenarios by Robin Galas	 -Discuss SWP grants and upcoming deadlines for submissions *Round 9 (FY 25-26) Plans due by end of October Funding details: Local & Regional: Current funding for Round 8 about \$1.3 Million for Local & \$750,000 for Regional Round 9 will see a reduction for 20% for Local & 22% for Regional due to reallocation to Nursing. Regional involves collaboration with other community colleges, industry & development. Funds are historically spent in the last year of the Round *Plans must align with labor market information to ensure relevance and student employment. Previous Practices: Many plans have been rolled over from previous rounds, indicating a lack of new program development SWP funds initially aimed for Research & Development often end up sustaining existing programs Round 8 (FY 24-25): Local Significant portions designated for personnel (73%) Local includes indirect costs of 5% per expenditure Approximately \$100,000 remains for innovation projects Regional Significant portions designated for personnel (78%) Limited funds available for innovation due to costs & contributions to Regional Joint Ventures (RIVs) Budgets constraints due to difficulty in acquiring additional funds for new initiatives due to tight budget allocations

Discussion/Action Items 2.2 Robin invites questions, comments & alternative budget scenarios or improvement	 Discussion with Dale Wagoner, VP Administrative Services regarding moving positions from departmental budgets to general fund to increase financial resources Conversations have been had with VP Wagoner. However, further discussion it needed Regardless, funding will remain tight for Round 9 (FY 25-26) Highlighted challenges faculty face with Program Area Review when funding is requested & the lack of timely data regarding budget allocations as well as approvals. This hinders timely purchasing or equipment & other resources Efforts are being made to ensure that funding is utilized effectively & no funds goes unused. Nursing Funding has not been confirmed, but legislation indicates it will be available by November 1st. It is expected to be a competitive grant process with specific priorities Status of LEAP funding has been reallocated by the state elsewhere
